

Anaheim High School is the Jewel of the Colony, the oldest and largest high school in the Anaheim Union High School District, with 3,224 students enrolled. Yet, it lacks one critical service all the other comprehensive high schools in the District have—a swimming pool.

A volunteer effort is aiming to change that by raising the funds needed to build a new swimming pool in place of the one on campus that was condemned approximately eight years ago.

The proposed swimming pool will meet the needs of students and be available to the community for a variety of aquatics programs. Most important, the pool will be used to teach kids how to swim and to be safe in the water.

But this can't happen without you.

A group of concerned parents, students, alumni, community members, city leaders, service-based organizations, elected officials, and businesses are partnering with the District on a capital campaign called *Bring Back the Splash at Anaheim High School Campaign* that will raise the resources to rebuild the swimming pool.

Budget cuts have taken a toll on school facilities. But not having a swimming pool available means local kids are not learning how to swim and that's a safety concern we can't ignore. According to research by the University of Memphis that was commissioned by the USA Swimming Foundation, nearly six out of 10 Latino children are unable to swim. The majority of Anaheim High School students are Latino.

Our goals are simple.

- Build an eco-friendly, state-of-the-art aquatics facility that meets the requirements of various athletic competitions
- Revive the tradition of Anaheim High School being a major competitor in CIF swimming and water polo events
- Maintain the swimming pool as a community resource
